TWC AEL Updates

TWC Middle Skills Gap Initiatives

- In July, TWC earmarked funds for initiatives to end the middle skills gap; up to \$9 million in grant funds for job creation, job preparedness, and job progression activities.

Recap of the AEL Fall Institute

- The virtual meeting convened 325 attendees, including AEL program administrators, instructional staff, career navigators and stakeholders
- 34 sessions held

- Session content focused on the four goals in the AEL Strategic Plan

- The plan, as approved by the Commission, was submitted to Texas Workforce Investment Council, the Legislative Budget Board and the Governor's office, as required by the General Appropriations Act
- This five-year plan enhances the original goals in the first statewide strategic plan
- The alignments and considerations section provides an overview of policies, plans, reports and statewide goals during the development, including advisory committee recommendations from the past two years.
- Four goals are
 - Goal 1: Increase Outcomes
 - Goal 2: Address demand with increased access to AEL
 - Goal 3: Enhance Customer Experience with Increased Coordination
 - Goal 4: Improve Program Effectiveness (focus of today's discussion)

Virtual Learning Video Project by TCALL

- In April 2020, the Commission approved funds for virtual learning resources (both in English and in Spanish) to provide distance and remote learning resources.
- Curriculum topics include basic education, digital literacy, and job search and workforce preparation
- Title slide: Cure your Content with Contextualized Videos from the Adult Ed Med Hospital
- Video project preview slide shows a one-minute commercial for the Adult Ed Med video resources
- ESL Verbal Instructions in English video is a five-minute lesson on how to use verbal commands. For example, “Do your homework,” and, “Don’t write your name.” A student, Fumi, who recently immigrated to the United States and is seeking work as a medical intake specialist, must use verbal commands in this role.
- ESL Verbal Instructions bilingual video is the same five-minute lesson on how to use verbal commands, provided through bilingual (English and Spanish) instruction.
- Let’s Review a Lesson Plan slide shows an example of a lesson plan for “Verbal Instruction,” which includes the Content Standards 2.0 alignments, objectives for the lesson, and materials needed

Workforce Career and Education Outreach Specialists since 2014

- One TWC State-level outreach team, two year- pilot program since May 2019,
- Seven regions awarded
- Sixty-one independent school districts with thirty specialists:
 - Partner with existing staff
 - No duplication of services

- Complement, not replace

Impact of the Teams Over the Last Two Years using Data

- Total number of sessions provided to students
 - Overall, total presentation sessions provided to students was 9,607
 - West Central Texas provided 2,832 sessions
 - North East Texas provided 565 sessions
 - Lower RGV provided 1,293 sessions
 - Gulf Coast provided 528 sessions
 - Central Texas provided 2,605 sessions
 - Capital Area provided 918 sessions
 - Borderplex provided 866 sessions
- Presentations to Program Partners (Technical, community colleges, business and industry leaders, and chambers of commerce)
 - Overall, total presentation sessions provided to program partners was 3,133
 - West Central Texas provided 328 sessions
 - North East Texas provided 9 sessions

AEL Strategic Plan Goal 4: Improve Program Effectiveness and objectives

Region 5 Education Service Center (Slides)

Brenda Schofield with Region 5 Education Service Center provides slides to share how ESC Region 5 uses data for program effectiveness

- **The Internal Monitoring Process:**
 - Smaller program allows a hands-on approach
 - On-site, face-to face data reviews, (scheduled and random)
 - Desk reviews
 - Short Google quizzes
 - Staff self-assessments
 - Analyzing TEAMS data

- TWC Monthly Performance Reviews
- **Using the Data to:**
 - identify training needs (immediate and ongoing)
 - identify resources needed (additional staff, equipment etc.)
 - identify if SOPs are adequate and followed
 - identify components of the program needing improvement
 - identify components of the program that are doing well
 - identify areas of the program to keep on Admin radar
- **Responding to the Findings**
 - Conduct a series of virtual lunch meetings with staff to ensure knowledge of best practices for student success and program effectiveness. (Brief 30-minute supplements to regular PD/ staff trainings or meetings)
 - Email monthly highlights targeting troubled areas/ action needed
 - One-to-one staff training and assistance
- **Virtual Lunches:** ESC Region 5 conducts a series of virtual lunch meetings with staff to ensure knowledge of best practices for student success and program effectiveness.
 - Supplement to regular PD activities
 - Meetings last no longer than 30 minutes
 - Session begins with Google quiz (see image)
 - Quiz provides immediate, anonymous feedback
 - Review answers to quiz
 - Q and A
 - Send follow-up quiz within a few days
