2	CHAIRMAN DANIEL: Good morning, everyone.
3	This meeting is called to order. Mr. Trobman, do we have any
4	public comment?
5	MR. TROBMAN: Good morning, commissioners.
6	Les Trobman, general counsel. We do have one commenter this
7	morning, Robin Harrison. Ms. Harrison, if you want to unmute
8	yourself, introduce yourself for the record, and begin. Ms.
9	Harrison? I think she was here earlier but she may have dropped
10	off so we'll monitor and get back with you all. Thanks.
11	CHAIRMAN DANIEL: Thank you, Mr. Trobman.
12	Good morning, Ms. Miller.
13	MS. MILLER: Good morning, sir.
14	CHAIRMAN DANIEL: Thank you. That brings us
15	to the end of Agenda Items 3 through 7. We'll take a short
16	recess.
17	CHAIRMAN DANIEL: All right, we're back. Mr.
18	Trobman, I understand our public commenter has signed on and is
19	available for public comment.
20	MR. TROBMAN: Yes, sir. Ms. Harrison, if you
21	can go ahead and unmute yourself and begin. Ms. Harrison?
22	MS. HARRISON: Yeah, I'm trying to get my
23	phone together here. It's not working right. Hold on one quick
24	second if you all can hold on just one second.
25	MR. TROBMAN: All right.

COMMISSIONER DEMERSON: Les, you can tell her we can hear her clearly.

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MR. TROBMAN: We can hear you.

MS. HARRISON: Oh, you all can hear me?

MR. TROBMAN: Yes, ma'am.

MS. HARRISON: OK. I am serving notice to the Civil Rights Division and General Counsel attorneys that know enough to clean up the mess they've created at TWC. While you as commissioners may not be aware of the problematic issues of your agency's role in investigated my fair housing civil rights issues, those involved have attempted to put to bed those many things that they have done wrong. They are attorneys and they are required to be ethical. Your general counsel put his signature on a single document once that was used to not sue my case by the Office of Attorney General. His signature is on four different documents and none of them have a date on it. Most importantly, he doesn't know when he signed the first and only time. Each document has a different title and attachment. He never sent me a copy that was-he even sent me a copy that was incomplete. Do you want me to talk-do you want to talk to me, hear me, and correct the issues or should I let an outside force review what's going on? See how the attorneys are using their status to promote discrimination by discriminating themselves against me as a Black woman receiving housing assistance. HUD pays for these investigations and their abuse of these funds

will be brought to light as this is not slander when my proof can come from the source, and just this morning I spoke with a supervisor dealing with a retaliation case that intake-I had a call come in there. They said that they would send it back to HUD for them to investigate it but it sat there on his desk for two weeks and nothing was done with it, and all of a sudden they wanted to give me a 10-day period, and I spoke with this lady today, a supervisor, and she hung up in my face twice today which there's never no excuse for that, and just because you don't like what I'm saying, just because I'm speaking doesn't mean that I'm being combative because there are too many-right now I'm in a threat of being homeless. I have continued to go through retaliation with the housing authority, and they are not an apartment complex, and if they keep trying to treat the housing authority as an apartment complex, they are not going to hold them accountable. I am asking that somebody hears me, look at these documents, review the things that have happened and clean it up because it's going to affect me and many other clients like me if this continues. It's not right what's happening, and I have everything that I need to prove it. I'm not talking off the top of my head with a he say-she say thing. I have proof of everything that I am saying, and I need somebody to take this serious enough to look at it because HUD and TWC cannot keep treating me like a tennis ball bouncing me back and forth. Something needs to be done to correct this and do the

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right thing, and hold the housing authority responsible and accountable, and anything that has been done that gave him an out to continue to do this to families needs to be corrected. Thank you.

Concerning the Estimated Unemployment Trust Fund Balance and the

Estimated Employment and Training Investment Holding Fund

Balance.

CHRIS NELSON: Good morning, chairman, commissioners, Mr. Townsend. For the record, Chris Nelson, chief financial officer. This morning you have before you the unemployment insurance trust fund projection, and that's the projection for October 1, 2023, and I'll walk through the 2023 column for your benefit. So we started on October 1, 2022, with a 2.13-billion-dollar balance. At this time, we are projecting 2.063 billion in revenue this year. That is again slightly down from the 2022 revenue of 2.6 billion largely based off our projections from the non-LEU COVID chargebacks that are going through review. As we collect the first quarter revenue here on May 1st, we'll have a much better projection of what that revenue reduction will be, and we'll adjust from that point but right now we're projecting 2.063 billion in revenue. We're projecting to pay out 2.3 billion right now so we are projecting to be at

1.9 billion balance on September 30th or October 1st, and that is above the floor of projected to be 1.3 billion so we're above the floor, below the ceiling which is right where we're hopeful to be. Related to that, on Section 3 is the ETIA account so as you know, if we're above the floor, it's good. If we're below the floor, we have to transfer from the ETIA account into the trust fund. If we're above the floor, the ETIA account funds the Skills appropriation for that year. So at this point we're projecting a 220-million-dollar balance after doing a Skills transfer of 19.9 million. I would like to note that the 19.9 is based off the current Skills appropriation pending legislation, the General Appropriations Act, if the Skills amount is updated, that amount could be increased based off the appropriations bill. That's all I have at this point. I'd be happy to answer any questions.

Reinstatement of Child Care Automated Attendance Tracking in Conjunction with the Implementation of the Texas Workforce

Commission's New Child Care Case Management System. 6

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ALLISON WILSON: Good morning, chairman, commissioners, Mr. Townsend. For the record, Allison Wilson with the Child Care & Early Learning Division. On March 9, 2021, you approved a discussion paper which directed staff to issue special guidance on attendance requirements during the procurement and implementation of a new system to track attendance. Implementation of the new system is scheduled to begin in mid May with phase one which includes automated attendance tracking. Phase two which will include full functionality for child care case management will be implemented in October of this year. Over the summer child care programs and parents will be onboarded and trained in the new system. Staff recommends rescinding the March 9, 2021, guidance with the rollout of phase one of the new system, beginning to collect child attendance data in mid May in the new system, and reinstating all requirements and procedures for child care attendance effective October $1^{\rm st}$ with the implementation of phase two and the full child care case management system. I'm happy to answer any questions you may have.

CHAIRMAN DANIEL: Any comments or questions?

CHAIRMAN DANIEL: It's been moved and seconded, and the motion carries. Agenda Item 10, Revisions to the Texas Rising Star Guidelines to Align with Previously Approved Amendments to the Texas Administrative Code.

ALLISON WILSON: Again, for the record,
Allison Wilson with Child Care & Early Learning. The commission
establishes rules to administer the Texas Rising Star program
including guidelines for rating child care programs for Starlevel certification and designation as entry level. Based on
past legislation, program improvements, and prior changes you
approved to TWC's child care rules, revisions to the guidelines
are needed. A full summary of the proposed revisions is provided
in the discussion paper. Staff would like to highlight two of
these revisions. First, voluntary participation in mentoring.
With the passage of House Bill 2607 during the 87th Texas
Legislature, participation in the Texas Rising Star program is
now mandatory for all child care services providers. Engaging

with a Texas Rising Star mentor is a key component of the program but not all programs want or need mentoring services. The proposed guideline revisions include new guidance for boards on entering into agreements with providers and allows providers to opt out of receiving mentoring services. Then the second thing to highlight is termination of a provider's agreement. With the implementation of House Bill 2607 as well as other rule amendments, staff identified the need to standardize processes for involuntary termination of a provider's child care services agreement. The proposed guideline revisions include guidance for boards that will help ensure consistency across the state. Staff recommends approval of the proposed revisions to the Texas Rising Star guidelines for publication and distribution. Staff also requests authority to make minor, nonsubstantive edits as needed. That concludes my remarks. Happy to answer any questions.
