

## MEETING OF THE TEXAS WORKFORCE COMMISSION

## 1 Monday, September 11, 2023 2 CHAIRMAN DANIEL: Good afternoon, everyone. This meeting is called to order. Mr. Trobman, has anyone signed 3 4 up for public comment? 5 MR. TROBMAN: No, sir. 6 CHAIRMAN DANIEL: Thank you very much. Good 7 afternoon, Ms. Miller. 8 MS. MILLER: Good afternoon, sir. 9 CHAIRMAN DANIEL: Thank you. This brings us 10 to the end of Agenda Items 1 through 8. We'll pause for a moment 11 to get ready for the rest of the meeting. 12 CHAIRMAN DANIEL: All right, we're back with 13 Agenda Item 9, Gifts and Donations. 14 JENNIFER TURNER: Good afternoon. 15 CHAIRMAN DANIEL: How are you? 16 JENNIFER TURNER: I'm fine, thank you. I am 17 Jennifer Turner and I'm here to present gifts and donations for 18 your review and approval on behalf of the Office of General 19 Counsel. State law allows TWC to accept donations of money, 20 services, and property that further the lawful objectives of the 21 agency as long as the donation is not prohibited by law. State 22 law and commission policy require gifts and donations over \$500 23 each to be accepted by the commissioners in an open meeting with 24 the donors' names, amounts, and donation purposes entered into

the public record. All donations for the applicable period were

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   for employee and event expenses covered by third parties. Six
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   employees took six trips paid for by five separate entities. The
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   donations have been presented to Mr. Serna, our executive
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   director, for review and initial acceptance. His acknowledgment
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   and approval is provided in the meeting packet which is also in
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   the public record, and we ask that you approve the gifts and
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   donations as presented.

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   Fiscal Year 2024 Operating Budget.
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                         CHRIS NELSON: Good afternoon, chairman,
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   commissioners, Mr. Townsend. For the record, Chris Nelson, chief
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   financial officer. Last summer the commission approved TWC's
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   legislative appropriation request which has been adopted as part
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   of the General Appropriations Act following the 88th Regular
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Legislative Session. Today I'm bringing modifications to the 2024 GA amounts as part of our 2024 operating budget that we will submit in November to the Legislative Budget Board. Before you and for your approval is a proposed operating budget in the amount of \$2,673,512,231 which is 126,000,000 higher than the GAA amounts. This difference is largely driven by increases in federal grants above what we projected last summer which include child care, unemployment insurance, WIOA, and the RESEA programs, and the respective strategies. Along with the requested increase in funding is an increase in FTEs above our cap of 4916.5 so we're requesting an FTE limit of 4925.5 which is 36 above our FTE limit in the GAA. This is due to high appeals activity, and so we'll be submitting a request to exceed these 100 percent federally funded positions after your approval or subject to your approval. On the last page you will see there's a WORKQUEST management fee that TWC will charge to cover its operating costs for administering the Purchasing from People with Disabilities Program. TWC is requesting a 4.5 percent WORKQUEST management fee to cover its operating costs. That concludes my comments and I'd be happy to answer any questions. CHAIRMAN DANIEL: Any comments or questions?

COMMISSIONER DEMERSON: Chris, I continue to appreciate the briefing that you and your team provide. That's it.

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1 COMMISSIONER TREVIÑO: Yeah, and I just 2 wanted to take this opportunity to thank you, Chris, and your 3 staff for all the hard work you did in preparing the operating 4 budget. 5 CHRIS NELSON: Thank you. CHAIRMAN DANIEL: Is there a motion? 6 7 COMMISSIONER DEMERSON: I move that we approve the Texas Workforce Commission 2024 operating budget as 8 9 recommended today by staff. COMMISSIONER TREVIÑO: I second the motion. 10 11 CHRIS NELSON: Thank you. 12 CHAIRMAN DANIEL: The motion carries. We're 13 unanimous. This is Agenda Item 11, Proposed Rules for 40 TAC 14 Chapter 810. This is the Lone Star Workforce of the Future Fund. 15 COLLIN BRADLEY: Good morning, Chairman 16 Daniel, Commissioner Treviño, Commissioner Demerson, Mr. 17 Townsend. For the record, I'm Collin Bradley with the Outreach 18 and Employer Initiatives Division. Commissioners, before you 19 today is for consideration for your approval is the proposed 20 rule creation of Chapter 810, Lone Star Workforce of the Future 21 Fund. The proposed amendments will establish the Lone Star 22 Workforce of the Future Fund grant program and set forth TWC's 23 procedures for administering the program. The goal of this 24 program is to ensure that the Texas workforce is capable of 25 filling available and emerging jobs in this state that require

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   less education than a bachelor's degree but more than a high
   school diploma. Staff recommends submitting the proposed rules
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   for publication in the Texas Register for a 30-day public
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   comment period. Staff also requests the ability to make minor
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   changes to the document in order to comply with the publication
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   requirements of the Texas Register and the Office of the
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   Secretary of State. This concludes my presentation. I'm

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1 CHAIRMAN DANIEL: Item 12. This is 2 Recertification of CRPs to Participate in the Purchasing from 3 People with Disabilities Program. 4 KELVIN MOORE: Good afternoon, 5 commissioners, Mr. Townsend. My name is Kelvin Moore 6 [Inaudible]. This afternoon I have for your consideration and 7 possible action three CRPs that are applying for recertification to continue participating in the Purchasing from People with 8 9 Disabilities Program. All three CRPs meet the requirements for 10 recertification and are paying minimum wage or higher to provide 11 services. Staff recommends the recertification of the following 12 three CRPs listed in the discussion papers: Open Wings 13 Independent Living Incorporated, Houston, Texas; Goodwill 14 Industries of Central East Texas Incorporated, Lufkin, Texas; Nueces Center for Mental Health & Intellectual Disabilities, 15 16 Corpus Christi, Texas. With that I can answer any questions you 17 may have. 18 CHAIRMAN DANIEL: Any comments or questions? 19 COMMISSIONER DEMERSON: None here. 20 COMMISSIONER TREVIÑO: None here. 21 CHAIRMAN DANIEL: Is there a motion? 22 COMMISSIONER DEMERSON: I move that we 23 approve the recertification of the following community 24 rehabilitation programs to continue participation in the

Purchasing from People with Disabilities Program as recommended

today by staff. As mentioned, Open Wings Independent Living,

Goodwill Industries of Central East Texas, and Nueces Center for

Mental Health & Intellectual Disabilities.

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COMMISSIONER TREVIÑO: I second the motion.

CHAIRMAN DANIEL: It's been moved and seconded and the motion carries. Thank you. This is Agenda Item 13, AEL Contracted Measures and Targets for Program Year 23-24.

MAHALIA BALDINI: Good afternoon, Chairman Daniel, Commissioner Demerson, Commissioner Treviño, and Mr. Townsend. For the record, Mahalia Baldini, Workforce Development Division. This afternoon I am here to present you with the Adult Education & Literacy Program Year 23-24 contracted measures and performance-based funding criteria as outlined in your notebook materials. The first issue for consideration is contracted measures. Your notebook materials outline these measures and targets including participant enrollment, measurable skill gains, and exit-based outcomes. Table 1 in your notebook materials reflects the participant enrollment targets which include both the negotiated targets which are reflective of the cost-pers in relation to this year's allocation as well as any carryforward targets in relation to any 22-23 balances. Tables 2 and 3 in your notebook materials reflect targets required by respective federal and state authorities when it comes to measurable skill gains and are exit-based measures. The second issue for your consideration is performance-based funding

1 criteria. The program year '23 allocations are composed of a two 2 percent holdback. In order for our grantees to be able to access 3 this two percent holdback, they must first meet the commission-4 approved performance-based funding criteria. So for the program 5 year 23-24, we have two performance-based funding criteria we 6 would like for the commission to consider. The first criteria is 7 rapid enrollment which encourages our grantees to meet their participant enrollment targets at 60 percent before December 8 9  $31^{\rm st}$ , and the second measure has to do with our accelerated 10 measurable skill gains which incentivizes early attainment of 11 measurable skill gains for our customers by the end of March. 12 This concludes my remarks and I'm happy to answer any questions 13 that you may have. 14 CHAIRMAN DANIEL: Any comments or questions? COMMISSIONER DEMERSON: None here. 15 16 COMMISSIONER TREVIÑO: None here. 17 CHAIRMAN DANIEL: Is there a motion? 18 COMMISSIONER DEMERSON: I move that we 19 approve the Adult Education & Literacy contracted measures and 20 performance-based funding criteria for program year 2023 through 21 2024 as described in the discussion paper and presented by 22 staff. 23 COMMISSIONER TREVIÑO: I second the motion.

CHAIRMAN DANIEL: It's been moved and

seconded and the motion carries. Thank you.

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1 MAHALIA BALDINI: Thank you. 2 CHAIRMAN DANIEL: This is Agenda Item 14, 3 Board Nominations. 4 CHERIE DUDLEY: Good afternoon, chairman, 5 commissioners, and Mr. Townsend. For the record, Cherie Dudley 6 with Workforce Development. Today for your consideration we have 7 Workforce Board nominations for Cameron County, South Texas, 8 Tarrant County, Heart of Texas, Golden Crescent, Middle Rio 9 Grande, North Texas, and Panhandle. Staff recommends approval on 10 the presented nominees and I'm here to answer questions you may 11 have. 12 CHAIRMAN DANIEL: Any comments or questions? 13 COMMISSIONER DEMERSON: None here. COMMISSIONER TREVIÑO: None here. 14 15 CHAIRMAN DANIEL: Is there a motion? 16 COMMISSIONER DEMERSON: I move that we 17 approve the local Workforce Development Board member nominees 18 presented today for the following: Workforce Solutions Cameron 19 County, South Texas, Tarrant County, Heart of Texas, Golden 20 Crescent, Middle Rio Grande, North Texas, and Panhandle as 21 previously stated. 22 COMMISSIONER TREVIÑO: I second the motion. 23 CHAIRMAN DANIEL: It's been moved and 24 seconded and the motion carries. 25 CHERIE DUDLEY: Thank you.

CHAIRMAN DANIEL: Thank you. This is Agenda Item 15, Fiscal Year 2024 Statewide Initiative Reviews with staff recommendations. Commissioners, a couple of process questions. So I think there's nine of these that have been separated out. These are things that came out of the July  $25^{th}$ work session. We can do this a couple of different ways. We can just take them all up for discussion and ask staff questions about individual programs that we've identified through this or we can go one by one and ask questions or staff can make a presentation about each one and then we can ask questions. Similarly, when we vote on them, we can vote on them one by one or we can wrap them all up into one motion and move forward. My preference would be-I don't actually care how we vote them out so if somebody feels strongly about that, you should speak up but, on the discussion, I more or less just like to cut straight to the questions unless there's some need for you to read us a whole bunch of stuff. The papers were very clear and well laid out. The staff made very clear and direct recommendations so what I presume we would be voting on today are the staff recommendations that are contained in the papers. If somebody wants staff to make a presentation on each one, I'm certainly glad to let them do that. I just want to make sure we get all the information out there. I have a couple questions about two different ones, and so there's going to be time for questions on all of them. Does anybody have a preference here?

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1 COMMISSIONER DEMERSON: I agree that we 2 don't need them to read through each and every one of them. I'm 3 fine with that. I think we had a work session where we've gone 4 over them sufficiently. If we have questions, we have an 5 opportunity to ask questions but then I think just taking them 6 and moving on the ones that we're in support of or if we're 7 going to take individual ones and move it that way, that works 8 for me. 9 COMMISSIONER TREVIÑO: I would just, like 10 you all said, not have them present it like we've already talked 11 about but I would like to go by the discussion paper so I can 12 keep it in the-13 CHAIRMAN DANIEL: That is a very reasonable 14 request. 15 COMMISSIONER TREVIÑO: [Inaudible]. 16 CHAIRMAN DANIEL: All right, we'll take them 17 up in the order that the discussion papers are. Do you want to 18 do a motion at the end of each discussion paper or do them all 19 at the end? Do you have a preference on that? Does anybody have 20 a preference on that? Is it easier to dispatch them as we go? 21 COMMISSIONER DEMERSON: It's probably easier 22 that way. 23 CHAIRMAN DANIEL: OK, we'll do that. All 24 right, so the first one we're going to take up is a workforce

strategy for rural Texas. Staff has some recommendations laid

out here in their discussion paper. Are there any comments or questions on this one?

COMMISSIONER DEMERSON: None from me.

COMMISSIONER TREVIÑO: I have just a few. Regarding the rural workforce working group, I understand that bringing work group member nominations before the commission for approval will delay the process a few weeks. However, I feel that it will be—it will keep the workgroup consistent with the process of all other workgroups and advisory committees, for example, the child care workgroup and the PPD and AEL advisory committees, etc. But I just recommend that the names proposed for the working groups be brought to the commission for approval.

CHAIRMAN DANIEL: Anything else on this one?

COMMISSIONER TREVIÑO: And then for the next regarding the rural summit for the information provided by the rural workforce group, that it is a best practice to begin the conversation and collecting information. I also believe that the conference will provide a valuable opportunity to hear the insights and needs of rural workforce areas from participants to allow sufficient time to study—for the study to be effective so I kind of recommend that we host the rural summit first and then afterwards determine the best timeframe to conduct a paid study using the insight from the summit. For number three, I have no comment. The next one is regarding the priority scoring for

Upskill Texas application. I agree with staff recommendation to wait until evaluating the results of the current funding. After the results are evaluated, then bring it back for their recommendation and the parameters and the recommended funding amount. The last one would be regarding the increase of funding for the high-demand job training and TIP grants. I encourage staff after the initial high-demand job training grant and TIP applications are awarded that the funds still remaining to reach out to the boards who have not yet applied for the fiscal year. And then regarding the outreach efforts for rural initiative, I am in favor of option one since there isn't a study validating the effectiveness of this type of campaign in rural areas administered by TWC which include the extended paid media campaigns. After the small paid media campaign is launched, then the data will show whether an extension is needed. That's all I have for that group.

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CHAIRMAN DANIEL: Any other comments or questions on the rural strategy discussion paper?

COMMISSIONER DEMERSON: [Inaudible]. Are we looking—the options that are presented here, I don't know if we are taking action on those three items as well. In the efforts to provide outreach and getting the word out, I mean I'm going with the max. It's like this—do this in a big, big way and get out as much as we can, and I think option three provides one end to but I hear Commissioner Treviño's comments so just know that

I'm for a maximum but, chairman, you probably have been working on this a lot harder so I'm not sure—I'd like to hear your thoughts on that as well.

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CHAIRMAN DANIEL: So I'm kind of torn. I guess I would have picked option two but I'm not going to be the guy that lands like squarely in the middle.

COMMISSIONER DEMERSON: That's OK.

CHAIRMAN DANIEL: Option two is really my preference. I think you can do too much paid media. I think it can move-I think you can sort of get off your earned media kind of platform. I think we have a lot of opportunities to (a) do some earned media, (b) we've got some great people in the field [inaudible]. I think work that we can do via social media and that sort of thing so option two is going to be my choice. That's where I would land. As to all of Commissioner Treviño's other comments including some direct comments about both the summit and the advisory group, I would take those and adopt those as my own if he's willing just to leave the need for doing an amendment, I think I would do that, and if you don't mind, let me just do this and then we can continue our discussion. I'm going to go ahead and make a motion on this so we can take this up if there's a second. I move we approve the staff recommendations that we heard today for a workforce strategy for the rural Texas discussion paper as presented here today with option two on item seven and incorporating the other amendments

that Commissioner Treviño has recommended. If there's a second, 1 2 we'll proceed with our discussion. 3 COMMISSIONER DEMERSON: Second. 4 CHAIRMAN DANIEL: All right, it's been moved 5 and seconded so the motion before us is essentially what staff's 6 recommended, a couple of tweaks that Commissioner Treviño has 7 made to that with regard to some timing on some issues, and then 8 it would have option two in it for the item seven, the outreach 9 and employer initiatives that employer initiatives would do. Is 10 there any further discussion on this item? 11 COMMISSIONER DEMERSON: None here. 12 COMMISSIONER TREVIÑO: None here. 13 CHAIRMAN DANIEL: All right, is there a-I 14 vote aye. Is there any dissenting votes? All right, it carries 15 unanimously. All right, let's move to the middle skills gap. Any 16 comments or question on the middle skills gap discussion paper? 17 COMMISSIONER DEMERSON: None here. 18 COMMISSIONER TREVIÑO: I've got a few, yeah. 19 CHAIRMAN DANIEL: Yep. 20 COMMISSIONER TREVIÑO: Regarding the rural 21 workforce working group, I understand that bringing the

workforce working group, I understand that bringing the workgroup member nominations—oh, hold on, that's this one. Let me—regarding the WIOA statewide funding towards the Upskill Texas Initiative, I agree with staff recommendation of wait until evaluating the results of the current funding. After

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   results are evaluated, then bring it back to their
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   recommendation for parameters and recommended funding amounts.
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   For the second one, I don't have any comments on that one. The
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   next one regarding the funding exams and/or licensure or
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   credential assistance, I support staff recommendation for number
   one and two for the initiatives but I want to be mindful of the
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   staff work closely together to ensure attainable measures for
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   the tracking of the initiative. I believe that's it for that
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   one.
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                         CHAIRMAN DANIEL: All right. Any other
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   comments or questions?
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                         COMMISSIONER DEMERSON: None here.
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                         CHAIRMAN DANIEL: Let me lay out a motion.
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   Commissioner Treviño, I was listening carefully. I don't think
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   you changed anything relative to the staff recommendations, and
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   your request to have measurable things is a-we should just put
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   that on everything that we do here. That was a good suggestion.
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   Let me do this. I move we approve the staff recommendations for
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   the middle skills gap discussion paper as presented here today.
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   If there's a second, we'll proceed with discussion.
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                         COMMISSIONER DEMERSON: Second.
                         CHAIRMAN DANIEL: It's been moved and
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   seconded. Is there any further discussion on this item?
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                         COMMISSIONER DEMERSON: None here.
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                         COMMISSIONER TREVIÑO: None here.
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1 CHAIRMAN DANIEL: All right, I'm voting aye. 2 Is there any dissenting votes? All right, it carries 3 unanimously. We'll take up the foster youth network now. Are 4 there any comments or questions for staff? 5 COMMISSIONER DEMERSON: None here. COMMISSIONER TREVIÑO: The only comment I 6 7 have is regarding the Texas Foster Youth Network to assist with 8 balancing the budget of the remaining WIOA and TANF funds. I 9 support using 3,000,000 from WIOA and 1,000,000 from the TANF. 10 CHAIRMAN DANIEL: Is that what you were 11 anticipating? 12 LESLIE KRUSE: Yes, sir. It was. For the 13 record, Leslie Kruse, Workforce Division. You can use the-14 CHAIRMAN DANIEL: I should have done that at 15 the front. Now I have to apologize because I made fun of Chris 16 for not sticking around until I said motion carries, and I just 17 jumped all over my own procedure. Welcome, Leslie. 18 LESLIE KRUSE: Well, thank you, sir. 19 CHAIRMAN DANIEL: All right. Is there any-do 20 you want to make a motion or you want me to do it? 21 COMMISSIONER TREVIÑO: Oh, I can make the 22 motion. I move we approve the Texas Foster Youth Network 23 initiative as set forth in the discussion paper and related 2.4 staff response memorandum and discussed here today with the 25 change to allow the use of 3,000,000 for the WIOA and 1,000,000

from TANF if need to balance the [inaudible] reserve balances budget.

COMMISSIONER DEMERSON: I second.

CHAIRMAN DANIEL: Are there any dissenting

votes? Any further discussion?

COMMISSIONER DEMERSON: None here.

CHAIRMAN DANIEL: This one carries

unanimously. Let's take up the workforce and economic development discussion paper. Any comments or questions?

COMMISSIONER DEMERSON: None here.

three regarding the recommendation to create a statewide working group to gather best practices as earlier as I mentioned I recommend that names of the proposed workgroup be brought to the commission for approval. I understand that bringing the workgroup nominations may delay it a few weeks, the process, but however I feel that it will keep the working group consistent with the other groups as I mentioned before, for example, child care, PPD, and the AEL advisory, etc. For the outreach plan including strategies to ensure employees regarding the outreach campaign option, I suggest beginning with option one. Staff recommended for allotting 10,000 inhouse development. Then in the future years if there's money available, we can have the data to support the expansion of that campaign.

1 CHAIRMAN DANIEL: All right. Any other 2 comments or questions? 3 COMMISSIONER DEMERSON: None here. 4 CHAIRMAN DANIEL: I don't object to either 5 one of your suggestions. Let me offer a motion. I move we 6 approve the staff recommendations for the workforce and economic 7 development discussion paper as presented here today to incorporate Commissioner Treviño's suggestions. Is there a 8 9 second? 10 COMMISSIONER DEMERSON: Before I second, let 11 me make sure. So option one is \$10,000 on the outreach campaign 12 options, and then option two is 100,000 to 500,000. That seems 13 like a big jump. 14 CHAIRMAN DANIEL: It is but I think there's 15 some vendor contracts in there, and I think if I heard 16 Commissioner Treviño correctly, and I'll let you speak for 17 yourself but what I heard was let's do what's suggested under 18 option one. If we get the success we're looking for, we'll come 19 back and revisit this and put some more resources into this. 20 That's actually a prudent response. I think we have a lot more 21 expertise in house than we probably think we do on this. I think 22 this is a good way for us to figure that out. 23 COMMISSIONER DEMERSON: OK. 24 COMMISSIONER TREVIÑO: I couldn't have put 25 it better myself. Thank you.

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                         CHAIRMAN DANIEL: I just want to clarify for
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   the record that when he said as presented here today, it is as
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   presented in the meeting notes here today. That paper was well
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   defined and makes staff recommendations. It's been moved and
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   seconded. Are there any dissenting votes? Hearing none, this one
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passes unanimously. Let's take up esports as a STEM program. Any comments or questions?

COMMISSIONER DEMERSON: None here.

COMMISSIONER TREVIÑO: I just fully support the esports initiative and recognize the value and positive impact that this will have on future workforce.

CHAIRMAN DANIEL: All right. I have a couple questions. Of the original \$500,000, how much of that have we awarded?

LESLIE KRUSE: Stand by, chairman. We'll get that for you. I'm going to ask Sandra Williams if she has that information on the total awards.

CHAIRMAN DANIEL: All right, while you're getting that, also get this information for me. What types of activities that we've awarded funds for, what types of activities that we intend to award funds for, and then a third question is what results have we already seen from the grant awards we've made from the original \$500,000.

LESLIE KRUSE: Chairman, I can answer on what we've seen so far. Those grants just started so we do not have any data as of yet. I believe the first quarter reporting is going to be due at the end of this month so we should have data after that.

CHAIRMAN DANIEL: All right. And then, OK. And the types of activities, you can tell me that when you tell me the funding?

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LESLIE KRUSE: Yes, sir.

CHAIRMAN DANIEL: What—so there was another recommendation in here from staff to fund a study about esports. I think you had asked for \$300,000 to do that. Tell me a little bit more about the study and what we're hoping to learn from the study.

COMMISSIONER DEMERSON: Let me answer some of that as well. So esports right now is an initiative that's over in the governor's office, the film and music office, gaming office, and the like, and so there's a lot of talk about esports right now. Actually, it's going to be an Olympic sport and it's going worldwide and so trying to inventory the assets, finding out what's out there in regards to this whole venue is where we were going research and analysis of the impact and what that's going to mean here in Texas. A lot of employers are out there in that space, a lot of Texas citizens, and so as we study things like AI and study initiatives like this, making sure that we're just not out there guessing, this will actually allow us to really quantify, qualify, have a place where we have valuable information that will allow us to propel forward in the future so up to-and this is up to \$300,000. It's not 300,000 solid but report along those lines.

CHAIRMAN DANIEL: I think even if it works, probably money well spent. Commissioner, I would say this. I'm skeptically supportive of this initiative because I'm not exactly sure what we're trying to get at. Much like Upskill Texas, I hesitate to be for putting more money into grant awards until we kind of know what we've done with the awards, and furthermore I would love to see the results of the study before we dedicated more funding to this. If you guys just want to press forward with more money, I'm not going to put up any kind of fight. I think anything we can do to help youth kind of get on a career, we should be doing that, and my understanding is that staff recommends that we put this over in our youth initiatives and we treat it like we treat the other youth initiatives, and I'm definitely for that. I guess I'm just in a wait-and-see mode on more grant money. I'm a hundred percent and enthusiastically supportive of your-of the idea that we would do a study to kind of see where we are and what we want to do. I think \$300,000 is a great not-to-exceed threshold. That's just where I am, and again, if we want to just press forward with the way staff recommended it here today, then that's what we'll do. I'm not going to object to that. I'm just saying that I think I would prefer we set the new funding aside, do the study, see what we get, and then try to be more directed with the second round of funding but let's proceed with our discussion and find out where we are.

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COMMISSIONER DEMERSON: Yeah, and we had discussed, we talked about the fact that this study—I think we're all asking the same question, you know, what are the results [inaudible] as Leslie said, the results are not there just yet, and once we really take this opportunity, we know it's something that's coming along and it's something of the future and the like and so we decided to kind of—the team decided to kind of press ahead. My big deal was 300 for the research and the analysis and the other side is we're already doing it, let's jump in here and do it again so that was the thought behind that.

CHAIRMAN DANIEL: OK, good discussion. Let's go ahead and get a motion on the table so we can try to move forward here.

COMMISSIONER DEMERSON: So I move that we approve the esports as a STEM program initiative as set forth in the discussion paper.

COMMISSIONER TREVIÑO: I second the motion.

CHAIRMAN DANIEL: It's been moved and seconded. Is there any further discussion? All right, are there any dissenting votes? OK, motion carries. Let's take up the reentry conference. Any comments or questions?

COMMISSIONER DEMERSON: I'll comment on this real, real quick, the reentry conference. I think we have a GRACE conference coming up, this second one in Arlington if I'm

not mistaken, and there was discussion around the agency that doing this again and the like and so after talking with the team I think this is very important for employers that are looking at those—looking at a second chance and reentry and into reentering into the workforce. This was an opportunity for us to look at those organizations that have a vested interest in this area, not taking it on at the staff level and allocating money that's out there. I think it's about an estimated cost of about \$30,000 with an organization that would be supportive of these efforts so that we don't lose the momentum of that GRACE conference that's taking place for the second year. The first year amazingly successful. Second year we're hoping the same but there are organizations out there that will probably do this again, and I'd love to be supportive of those efforts because employers and the citizens in Texas benefit from that.

COMMISSIONER TREVIÑO: I agree with the need for continuing the second chance initiative but regarding the GRACE conference itself, I'm concerned with partnering with an outside entity. I think we might lose the input regarding the information presented to the focus of the event, and I suggest that we reconsider transferring that to an outside entity and keep this hosted by TWC. I agree with allocating the 30,000 of WIOA funds for TWC to host the second chance events.

COMMISSIONER DEMERSON: Yeah, I think my reason for looking outside was talking with the staff, and I

guess it was a decision that we would make by looking at the amount of work staff already had on the plates, conferences and the like is why I pretty much said, well, if we're overworked on this side or we have a lot on the plate here, it's not that they couldn't do it but there may be a need to do that outside so that it pushes forward in that regard but I guess the team would do whatever we want, and so I'm not heart set one way or the other. My push was basically trying to relieve the staff in a sense on the TWC side. That's where I was going here.

COMMISSIONER DEMERSON: Agency?

COMMISSIONER TREVIÑO: Agency to make sure that we're leading the discussion and what we want to put out there.

COMMISSIONER DEMERSON: OK, and commissioner, that's an initiative, an area, and we feel strong about that. I'd support those efforts but I just wanted to put on the table, that was my reason on both sides.

CHAIRMAN DANIEL: I think that you—I mean you make a very good point. I'm actually inclined to support Commissioner Treviño on this idea of keeping it inhouse. I appreciate your argument for why that might be. I think in this particular space there are just—there are many, many divergent viewpoints on this and I want to make sure TWC sticks to our

1 mission which is we need to get folks to work and in a job 2 that's self-sustaining and meaningful for them no matter what 3 their life circumstances have been. I want to make sure we stick 4 on that. And then I want to get this on the record while we're 5 talking about this. I received a tremendous amount of positive 6 feedback on our efforts here from the chancellor at TSTC among 7 others about our efforts on this, and so definitely something that we want to continue. 8 9 COMMISSIONER DEMERSON: I think that's 10 fantastic. If we're doing it in house, then I'm all for that. 11 CHAIRMAN DANIEL: There we go. All right. If 12 there's no further sort of preliminary comments, let's get a 13 motion on the record and then we'll complete our commentary and 14 move forward. COMMISSIONER DEMERSON: I move that we 15 16 approve the reentry conference initiative set forth in the 17 discussion paper as discussed as well and it be done by the 18 Texas Workforce Commission versus an outside entity. COMMISSIONER TREVIÑO: I second the motion. 19 20 CHAIRMAN DANIEL: Is there any further 21 commentary? Are there any dissenting votes? The motion carries 22 unanimously. Let's move to the Office of the Governor small

COMMISSIONER DEMERSON: Comments on that basically and I'll say this real quick based on the Governor's

business and entrepreneurship paper. Any comments or questions?

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Office and Small Business Division and we are in an MOU situation with them right now, this is an opportunity once again for us to have factual information about small business in Texas and the workforce as well, and so the state of the workforce from an internship standpoint, apprenticeship standpoint, all of those areas as it relates to small businesses in the state that I represent, I advocate for on this side, again I'm trying to get information together where we're able to use that in ways that can be of benefit to us here at the state.

COMMISSIONER TREVIÑO: I agree. No comment.

CHAIRMAN DANIEL: The only comment I would have is this. Do we spend all of this grant every year like historically?

LESLIE KRUSE: No, sir, we do not.

grant amount absorb the cost of the study which I do think is useful and necessary? I hate to give—I agree with the need for the study. I hate to give more money to a grant when the grant is not expending the total amount, and full disclosure, I was the governor's staff member who administered that grant for four years, and we didn't spend all the money then either.

COMMISSIONER DEMERSON: Chairman, I actually was the staff member on the governor's team who initiated that here at the Workforce Commission when it first started, and so I'd be curious—I'd want to look at the past reports on how that

money allocated and what's coming back, what we're not spending. I agree with you wholeheartedly if the money is not being spent, let's utilize what's not being spent for that but let's make sure that we check to make sure that they don't have intentions to spend it before we start taking money from it. In that regard we need to be sure that they're not going to do it because that's a carve-out of something that they may have in mind but if it's not being spent, let's definitely look at it that way for sure.

CHAIRMAN DANIEL: Do you want to table this, get that information and come back?

COMMISSIONER DEMERSON: No, I don't want to table it. I think—

CHAIRMAN DANIEL: OK.

saying that the money's unspent, then let us look at that but we'll probably need to have a conversation because you're going to need to ask them if it's going to be spent before we assume that it's not. This is new money that we're talking about. Mr. Chairman, maybe to the point that if it's money that's left over, then we don't allocate any new money from that standpoint. We basically take it back from that point but we don't shut ourselves off from the point that if it's all spent, then we're not in a position to go forward with it because we've not approved it today.

CHAIRMAN DANIEL: Uh, yeah. Let me think about that. Make your motion and then let's see if we can structure this in a way to do what we want to do.

COMMISSIONER DEMERSON: I move we approve the amendment of the current interagency cooperation contract

the amendment of the current interagency cooperation contract with the Office of the Governor to include a small business workforce report with a survey and data up to \$75,000 as set forth in the discussion paper as proposed today, as discussed today.

COMMISSIONER TREVIÑO: And I'll second the motion.

Offer this as an amendment, and if you accept it. Basically, if there's \$75,000 left that they haven't spent, that's the \$75,000. If for some reason they're going to spend all the grant, then there's another \$75,000 that would come in to pay for this study specifically and only the study. Is that fair? Does that sound like what we just agreed to? I think it does.

COMMISSIONER DEMERSON: Yes, all right.

CHAIRMAN DANIEL: Mr. Trobman? Yes. All right, are there any dissenting votes on this? Hearing none, this motion passes unanimously. Texas Interns Unite! conference. Questions or comments.

COMMISSIONER DEMERSON: So you guys have participated in a lot of the Texas Interns Unite! initiatives

over the years and so the discussion paper laid out here today talks about National Internships Day, National Intern Day with the Texas Twist Conference but the reality behind the discussion paper is really to have funds appropriated for not initiatives that include National Internship Day with the Texas Twist initiatives with both high school and college students so I don't know if that's in this makeup but I want to make sure that we're working on high school and college students and it's a Texas Interns Unite! initiatives, not just National Internship Day but other initiatives. We're going to be in the Valley with a Rally in the Valley in a week, and then there's Power in the Pines, and so there are a lot of initiatives that have been put out there and some very successful good return on the investment so I think those are the only comments that I wanted to add to this paper that's not listed here.

CHAIRMAN DANIEL: Yeah, comments or questions?

COMMISSIONER TREVIÑO: Yeah, I just wanted to say I've experienced the benefits of the internship program and support this effort. I've seen the results and hear firsthand so I'm for that.

CHAIRMAN DANIEL: My only concern about the whole thing has been the extreme amount of enthusiasm and optimism and my ability to match that. These kids that come to this thing are absolutely amazing, and you reach a certain age

where you start worrying about whether or not the next generation is going to pull it off, and if you've reached that age and you have that question, come to one of these conferences so we can answer that for you.

think you said it. I overheard you making a comment that as you get a certain age, you know what you like to do is give a lot of your advice and wisdom and guidance and things of that nature so these are opportunities to really [inaudible] students but employers benefit, our Texas citizens benefit, and it works. The employment and the internships lead to jobs and careers and the like, and a lot of us even on the dais and in this audience may have experienced an internship route in some form or fashion while in college or high school.

CHAIRMAN DANIEL: While we're on the subject, you know, even TWC's—we've had since I've been here a great internship program, and I really even felt like that's come up a notch since we put a renewed focus on this. I think we're all benefiting from this. If there's no further preliminary discussion, we can put a motion on the record and then proceed with that.

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   Yes, we have one report from Eric Holen on the weekly benefit
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   amounts for the unemployment insurance program.
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                         ERIC HOLEN: Good afternoon. For the record,
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   Eric Holen, Unemployment Insurance. I have an update relating to
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   changes in the unemployment insurance weekly benefit amounts for
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   WBA that for new initial claims with an effective date on or
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   after October 1, 2023. The changes have no effect on existing
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   claims. In accordance with Texas Labor Code, Chapter 207.002,
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   the minimum and maximum weekly benefit amounts are set based on
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   the Labor Market Information Department's analysis of Texas
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   average weekly wage and covered unemployment for the preceding
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   calendar year. For 2022, LMI calculated that the average weekly
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   wage was $1,333.88, an increase of $70.76 or 5.6 percent over
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the preceding calendar year. The minimum weekly benefit amount is set at 7.6 percent of Texas average weekly wage and covered unemployment—covered employment but may not exceed one dollar in a year. Since the calculated amount exceeded the limit, the minimum weekly benefit amount will increase by one dollar to \$73 per week. The maximum weekly benefit amount is set at 47.6 percent of Texas's average weekly wage in covered employment but may not exceed \$14 in any year. Since the calculated amount exceeded the limit this year, the maximum weekly benefit amount will increase by \$14 to \$577 per week. To summarize, for new initial unemployment claims with an effective date on or after October 1, 2023, the minimum weekly benefit amount will be \$73, and the maximum will be \$577. Again, this has no effect on existing claims. This concludes my update. I'm available for any questions.
