

MEETING OF THE TEXAS WORKFORCE COMMISSION

Tuesday, May 21, 2024

CHAIRMAN DANIEL: Good morning, all. This meeting is called to order. Mr. Trobman, has anyone signed up for public comment? Thank you, Mr. Trobman, and good morning.

MS. MILLER: Good morning.

CHAIRMAN DANIEL: No, thank you. That brings us to the end of Agenda Items 1 through 8. We'll take a short recess.

CHAIRMAN DANIEL: All right, we're back.

This is Agenda Item 9, delegation of authority to the executive director and deputy executive director for contracts exceeding one million dollars.

MR. TROBMAN: Good morning, commissioners,
Mr. Townsend. Les Trobman, general counsel. On January 21, 2020,
in accordance with Texas Government Code, Section 2261.254, the
commission delegated to the executive director and the deputy
executive director the approval and signature authority
contracts that exceed one million dollars following commissioner
consultation. The commission order was subject to review on a
biennial basis. After recent review and consideration of the
optimal manner of ensuring commission engagement on high-valuedollar contracts, staff recommends that the commission amend its
delegation order to reaffirm the delegation of signature
authority to the executive director and the deputy executive
director for contracts that do exceed one million dollars while

1 also directing the executive director or his designee to provide 2 the commissioners a quarterly report on all agency contracts 3 that exceed one million dollars, and I'm available to answer any 4 questions that you may have. 5 CHAIRMAN DANIEL: Comments or questions? COMMISSIONER TREVIÑO: None here. 6 7 COMMISSIONER ESPARZA: No questions. 8 CHAIRMAN DANIEL: Is there a motion? 9 COMMISSIONER TREVIÑO: Chairman, I move we approve the amended delegation of authority of the approval of 10 11 contracts exceeding one million dollars to the executive 12 director and the deputy executive director pursuant to Texas 13 Government Code, Section 2261.254. 14 CHAIRMAN DANIEL: I second the motion. Any 15 discussion? No discussion? 16 COMMISSIONER TREVIÑO: No discussion. 17 CHAIRMAN DANIEL: Is there any dissenting 18 votes? 19 COMMISSIONER ESPARZA: I dissent. 20 CHAIRMAN DANIEL: All right. The motion 21 carries. This is Agenda Item 10, final rule reviews relating to 22 the General Administration, and that's 40 TAC Chapter 800, 23 Integrity of the Texas Workforce System, 40 TAC Chapter 802, and 24 Choices, and 40 TAC Chapter 811.

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REED O'BRIEN: Good morning, commissioners and Mr. Townsend. For the record, I'm Reed O'Brien with the Office of General Counsel. Texas Government Code, Section 2001.039, requires state agencies to review their rules every four years and determine whether the initial reasons for adopting the rules continue to exist. Before you today for your consideration for readoption of rules are the following three chapters from Title 40 of the Texas Administrative Code: Chapter 800, General Administration; Chapter 802, Integrity of the Texas Workforce System; and Chapter 811, Choices. In an open meeting on March 18, 2024, the commission approved the proposed reviews of those chapters for publication in the Texas Register for a 30-day public comment period. The proposed rule reviews were published in the March 29, 2024, issue of the Texas Register and no comments were received. Staff reviewed the three chapters and determined that the initial reasons for adopting the rules continue to exist and that the chapters are still needed so in accordance with the government code's requirements, staff recommends that the commission readopt chapters 800, 802, and 811 as included in today's meeting notebook and published on the agency's website. That concludes my presentation. I'm available to answer any questions.

CHAIRMAN DANIEL: Comments or questions?

COMMISSIONER TREVIÑO: None here.

COMMISSIONER ESPARZA: No questions.

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CHAIRMAN DANIEL: Is there a motion?

COMMISSIONER TREVIÑO: Chairman, I move we approve the adoption of the final rule reviews for 40 Texas Administrative Code, Chapter 800, General Administration, Chapter 802, Integrity of the Workforce System, and Chapter 811,

Choices, as recommended today by staff.

COMMISSIONER ESPARZA: I second.

CHAIRMAN DANIEL: It's been moved and seconded and the motion carries. This is Agenda item 11, proposed rules for 40 TAC Chapter 850, Vocational Rehabilitation Services Administrative Rules and Procedures.

JAMIE HAYWOOD: Good morning, chairman, commissioners, and Mr. Townsend. For the record, I'm Jamie Haywood with VR. Commissioners, before you today for your consideration for approval are proposed rule amendments to Chapter 850, Vocational Rehabilitation general rules. These proposed amendments clarify the VR Division's comprehensive system of personnel development standards for qualified vocational rehabilitation counselors. In alignment with 34 CFR 361.18, the proposed rule specifies the education and experience requirements for VR counselors. It also clarifies that VR counselors are considered qualified to perform nondelegable duties upon meeting the minimum initial standards for hire, successful completion of required training, and an initial probationary period that allows demonstration of performance.

Finally, the rule clarifies that the VR Division helps VR counselors advance as qualified personnel by making funds available for the required graduate education under the circumstances specified in the rule. Staff recommends submitting the proposed rule for publication in the Texas Register for a 30-day public comment period. Staff also requests the ability to make minor nonsubstantive changes to the document to comply with publication requirements of the Texas Register and the Office of the Secretary of State. This concludes my presentation and I'd be happy to answer any questions that you have.

CHAIRMAN DANIEL: Any comments or questions?

COMMISSIONER TREVIÑO: None here.

COMMISSIONER ESPARZA: No, sir.

CHAIRMAN DANIEL: Is there a motion?

COMMISSIONER TREVIÑO: Chairman, I move we

recommended today by staff.

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ERRY BALLAST: Good morning, Chairman

Daniel, Commissioner Treviño, Commissioner Esparza, and Mr.

Townsend. For the record, Kerry Ballast, Workforce Development

notebook materials gives an overview of the process and what was

learned while we did the analysis. Upon completion of this

analysis, staff recommend using the performance measures and the

associated program parameters for the award of fiscal year 2025

Chapter 133 Apprenticeship Training Program contracts. This

concludes my remarks. I'm happy to answer any questions?

COMMISSIONER TREVIÑO: The continued growth of apprenticeship reflects how great this model is. The parameters recommended will guarantee high-quality programs are funded at the \$4 contact hour rate but the current funding available could cause possible 40 percent reduction in awards which in turn could have greater impact across all industry and geographical distribution. I want to thank staff for continuing the search for ways to sustain the contact hour rate and fund as many contracts as possible.

CHAIRMAN DANIEL: Additional comments or questions? Is there a motion?

COMMISSIONER TREVIÑO: Chairman, I move we approve the use of performance measures for the award of fiscal year 2025 Texas Education Code Chapter 133 Apprenticeship Training Program contracts and the associated program parameters as described in the discussion paper and recommended today by staff.

COMMISSIONER ESPARZA: I second.

CHAIRMAN DANIEL: It's been moved and seconded, and the motion carries. Thank you. Agenda Item 13 has been postponed to a future meeting. This is Agenda Item 14, funding to support healthcare training initiatives. They're ganging up on us here.

MARY YORK: Good morning, chairman, commissioners, Mr. Townsend. For the record, I'm Mary York with Outreach and Employer Initiatives. At the April 30, 2024, commission meeting, staff were asked to bring forward a discussion paper with initiatives to address the shortage of healthcare workers in the state of Texas. Recent projections indicate employment in healthcare occupations will grow 23.9 percent by 2030 adding over 298,000 new jobs. The demand for all healthcare occupations is expected to grow faster than all other occupations combined. Staff have identified eight opportunities for increasing the number of healthcare workers across the state, and those opportunities are outlined in your meeting materials. Unless the commission prefers to skip straight to

discussion, we can provide some brief remarks on those eight initiatives. The first three are from Outreach and Employer Initiatives, the first of which is to allocate up to \$2,000,000 in 2024 WIOA statewide funds for Upskill Texas for healthcare employers seeking to upscale incumbent workers providing patient care. The second item is to use up to \$3,000,000 from the Skills Development Fund in 2024 and 2025 to fund a new initiative to support dual credit costs such as tuition and curriculum development or acquisition, to expand the availability of these programs across the state for healthcare occupations, and the third is to allow up to \$2,000,000 from the Skills Development Fund to be used for public sector healthcare employers seeking to train new or incumbent workers. Along with that one, staff recommends the temporary reduction of the prevailing wage requirement from 25 percent to 10 percent to ensure all areas of the state including rural areas have the opportunity to upskill their healthcare staff. With that, I will pass the mic to Joel Mullins to cover the five initiatives from Workforce Development.

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JOEL MULLINS: Good morning, chairman, commissioners, Mr. Townsend. For the record, I'm Joel Mullins with Workforce Development. Staff from the Workforce Development Division have identified an additional five opportunities to address the healthcare shortage. The first of these starts with number four in the discussion paper which is to make 1.5 million

dollars in WIOA Title I statewide funding available to community and technical colleges or independent school districts for the purpose of developing capacity in nursing training programs. This could include curricula, supplies, and instructor salary costs. Next, to make \$1,000,000 in WIOA Title I statewide funding available to local Workforce Development Boards by application to support paid internships for eligible youth and adults in private or public hospitals, healthcare clinics, home health organizations, and skilled nursing facilities. Number six would be to dedicate \$1,000,000 from the Texas Industry-Recognized Apprenticeship Grant program specifically for healthcare occupations. Number seven would be to dedicate \$600,000 in DOL Apprenticeship Expansion Grant funding for incentives to employers that opt to pursue establishment or expansion of registered apprenticeship programs with pathways leading to registered nurse. Then the eighth and final initiative is to launch a \$500,000 adult education and literacy initiative to assist internationally trained professionals in obtaining the credentials needed to continue their education and career pathways within Texas. This morning staff seeks direction on the opportunities presented here today to support the growth and development of the state's healthcare workforce. This concludes our remarks and we're happy to answer any questions.

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CHAIRMAN DANIEL: Any comments or questions?

COMMISSIONER TREVIÑO: None here.

COMMISSIONER ESPARZA: I do, chairman. Joel, Mary, thank you all very much and thank you for doing the work and creating these ideas. Chairman, thanks for the initiative to support the healthcare, especially in rural areas. I'm happy to support all these items. I want a little bit more information on item seven, and again, I also want to thank Kerry for engaging our office for answering a few questions that we had but ultimately kind of a high level, what is the 600K provide in addition to the healthcare apprenticeship program we already have? Hi, Kerry.

KERRY BALLAST: Good morning. For the record, Kerry Ballast. This is another unique opportunity we have with expansion grant funds. We do have employers who come to the agency and ask with assistance in registering apprenticeship programs with DOL, and that's all they want. They don't—they're not in pursuit of another grant or any of our other initiatives. Through DOL we have the ability to pay those employers roughly \$500 to \$600 per apprentice that they bring on as they create or expand a new program. This is not in addition to any other grant they're receiving.

COMMISSIONER ESPARZA: OK. So it's a new-basically a new initiative to support those expansions.

KERRY BALLAST: Yes, sir.

COMMISSIONER ESPARZA: Are we able to increase the funding for the healthcare apprenticeship grant in

1 another way because I know we have more money or we have money 2 available for that. The only thing I was making sure is that, 3 you know, I definitely want to be able to promote and engage 4 more hospitals and organizations to take advantage of that 5 apprenticeship money that we have but this is something separate 6 than that. 7 KERRY BALLAST: Yes, sir, it is, in addition 8 to. 9 CHAIRMAN DANIEL: Would it be fair to say separate to yes but in addition to some things we're already 10 11 doing? 12 KERRY BALLAST: Yes. 13 COMMISSIONER ESPARZA: OK. 14 CHAIRMAN DANIEL: This is a list that would 15 increase available options that are available to whomever, 16 employers, nonprofits, whatever is going on. 17 KERRY BALLAST: Yes, sir. 18 COMMISSIONER ESPARZA: OK, thank you very 19 much on this. Thanks. 20 KERRY BALLAST: Thank you. 21 CHAIRMAN DANIEL: And she backed away from 22 that microphone. I had just gotten my first question. No, all 23 I'm going to say is this is very timely. This is very well 24 thought out. It is very comprehensive. I appreciate all the work 25 that went into this. I've met now at this point with probably,

conservatively, 15 to 20 different healthcare providers in the state, hospitals, both public and private, others. There's just a lot of concerns. We've done a lot of good. I think that our healthcare apprenticeship program has been good but what I've learned is is that employers like certain tools based on their business model, and apprenticeship wasn't for everybody. Despite what I think, they didn't think that worked in their model, and I have to-you know, I think it's our job to respect that. I think this gives them a very good available set of tools. I think much of this could be used to help put good pipelines of employees in place so then we can start addressing some of these issues. There are things going on in other agencies and I think that this will work very well in concert with those things, and so we have a great list, I think a great opportunity for TWC to do something very timely and concrete to address what's a very real issue for Texas employers. If there's no further discussion, is there a motion?

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I agree with both the statements made by the chairman and Commissioner Esparza on this. It's timely and very needed, and I look forward to working with all of them. So I move to approve the funding of opportunities for supporting healthcare training initiatives as described in the discussion paper and presented today by staff.

COMMISSIONER ESPARZA: I second.

CHAIRMAN DANIEL: It's been moved and seconded, and the vote is unanimous. Thank you. Oh, he is ready for an executive director's report. Mr. Townsend.

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MR. TOWNSEND: Yes, sir. Good morning, chairman, commissioners. Look, I have a couple items. Let me start first with Eric Holen coming up to give us an update on where we are with the disaster related in the Houston area, on the unemployment claims part of it.

ERIC HOLEN: Good morning. Eric Holen with Unemployment Insurance providing an update on serving Texans affected by the recent severe storms. On May 17th the president authorized federal disaster aid for Texas to assist individuals affected by the severe storms under Declaration number DR-4781-TX. Currently the disaster declaration covers the following counties: Harris, Liberty, Montgomery, Polk, San Jacinto, Trinity, and Walker. This afternoon we will issue a press release announcing the availability of disaster unemployment assistance or DUA. The deadline to apply for DUA claims is July 16th. Individuals will first apply for regular unemployment benefits, however, if they are not eligible generally because they did not have enough work history or are self-employed or later exhausted benefits, we will take a DUA claim. We are reaching out to customers who submitted disaster-affected claim before the president's declaration and who are not eligible for regular benefits. As of this morning, approximately 320

individuals have submitted disaster-affected regular unemployment claims with 10 of those submitting a DUA claim. That concludes my update and I'm available for any questions.

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CHAIRMAN DANIEL: Any questions or comments?

COMMISSIONER TREVIÑO: None here.

CHAIRMAN DANIEL: Thank you.

MR. TOWNSEND: Thanks, Eric. The other item I'm wanting to mention like breaking news shortly before the commission meeting started, I think we all probably learned less than 20 minutes before this morning that Courtney Arbour, our Workforce Division director, has been selected as the new executive director at the Texas Department of Licensing and Regulation effective June 1st so obviously we're-I'm personally sad to see this news but at the same time excited for Courtney and of course thankful for all that she's brought to the workforce system over the years with TWC and prior to that at the local level so certainly we're supportive of that. I know she's been meeting, discussing with Ed the transition plan and that sort of thing so it's a very short window here we realize but just want to make sure that you had seen that news and again wish Courtney all the best and we'll move forward as we always do on these things so just wanted to make you aware of that so thank you. That's all I have.

CHAIRMAN DANIEL: All right, any other item of business that needs to come before the commission?

1 COMMISSIONER TREVIÑO: I just want to say congratulations also to Courtney. It will be a tremendous loss 2 3 for TWC but great for her. Wish her all the best. 4 COMMISSIONER ESPARZA: I second that also 5 but I'll-it stands a lot to know that she can be-she's able to 6 move at such a quick pace to get over there. I know TDLR is 7 already welcoming her because I'm getting text messages [inaudible] so I'm excited for them but it's also a great 8 9 opportunity for our office, not to mention the gain of access 10 that we have over there at TDLR now with her there so it's also 11 helpful and good for our program too. 12 CHAIRMAN DANIEL: Agreed. All right, is 13 there is a motion to adjourn? 14 COMMISSIONER TREVIÑO: I move to adjourn.
